
Gratitude Report 2021

From surviving to thriving

With an incredibly infectious smile, my 24-year-old son, Ryan, is found most days enjoying the many inclusive programs offered at Easter Seals NL. At 6 months of age, Ryan was diagnosed with epilepsy, autism, developmental delays, and Tuberous Sclerosis, a rare genetic disease that causes tumors to grow in multiple vital organs of the body. I knew nothing of this disease at his time of diagnosis, however, I did know that Ryan would need me to be more than just his mom; he would need an advocate, a voice, someone who would always put themselves directly in his shoes and answer the question "If this were you, what would you want?" I vowed to be his person.

While living out all of Ryan's school years in Gros Morne National Park, we took advantage of all the therapeutic benefits that nature could offer. I reached out to Easter Seals NL to avail of any services they could provide from afar, and as a result, Ryan benefited from the Equipment Loan Program, the Equipment Assistance Program, and Camp Bumbleberry. It became clear that once Ryan finished school, he would need a place to thrive; a place where he could live life to the fullest, as merely existing was not an option. Relocation proved to be necessary so four years ago we moved from Rocky Harbour to St. John's.

Off we went for our very first visit to Easter Seals NL. We toured the beautiful facility and heard about all the programs they had to offer Ryan. As we left the building Ryan said, "I can't believe she made me so excited, I am so happy." Since that day Ryan has enjoyed many programs including Wall Climbing, Boccia, Creative Music, Dansability, the Adult Day Program, and many more. Ryan can also be found enjoying the accessible playground and outdoor amphitheater on the Easter Seals NL grounds. And this past



Christmas Ryan was thrilled to have the opportunity to perform with Shanneyganock at the annual Celebrate the Season event, where his smile lit up the stage - what a memorable experience!

In the past four years, I have watched Ryan's confidence and self-esteem grow, and his social skills, sense of belonging, and mental health improve. The overall impact has been immeasurable. Ryan is not just existing, he is thriving. Closures due to the Covid-19 pandemic have given clear insight into what life would be without all the programs and services that Easter Seals NL has brought to Ryan's life. To say there was a significant void during this time would be an understatement.

Easter Seals NL is truly changing lives, providing children, youth, and adults who are living with disabilities and their families a place of enrichment, accessibility, and inclusion. As Ryan's mom, his voice, and his advocate, I would like to sincerely thank the donors and supporters. 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

To say that he was a demanding student is an understatement, and at one point, he even required two instructors. During this time, his swim instructor never gave up on him. She prepared visuals with specific goals and laminated them to take into the pool to aid his learning. As the weeks progressed, we could see Tyson's growth. He now walked out on the pool deck and waited for his instructor. He began to let her help mold his body into the position it needed for swimming. He listened and tried his best.



In less than one year, Tyson learned to swim with Easter Seals NL. And not just swim but swim exceptionally well. Now he can be found jumping off the side of the pool or diving into the water to retrieve items. Autism is heavy, and the struggles are every day. Milestones come slowly, and some days it feels like we will never get there. For Tyson, each task we teach is broken down into single steps; it is a process that most people will never experience. At the age of nine, he is still working on printing his name and riding a bike, vet he has learned to swim thanks to Easter Seals NL. One step closer to a more inclusive community

For over 10 years, Easter Seals NL dreamt of building the first inclusive park in St. John's, a place where families and children could create playful memories, barrier-free. And in 2015, the work finally began. Together, we would build a legacy that would create a better community in our part of the world.

The 'See Ability in Disability' capital campaign was launched, and thanks to the incredible generosity from donors, supporters, and the community who supported the initiative, as well as all Newfoundlanders and Labradorians who purchased tickets through our Luxury Cabin Lottery, we were able to begin building. In June 2017, ground broke for phase 1.

We started to envision what this place would soon mean to families in the community and our participants; a place where children with and without disabilities can access play in a fun and safe environment, free of challenges. In 2018, the families of Easter Seals NL, local schools, and the public were invited to celebrate the grand opening of the Jeremy Cross Memorial Playground, named after an amazing Easter Seals NL participant. But we weren't done yet! We had big plans to expand the park so we began to design phase 2, which grew to include a beautiful pavilion, bonfire pit, bbq area, and sensory gardens; the perfect event space for anyone.


In June 2021, Easter Seals NL celebrated the grand opening of phase 2 with our incredible donors and supporters, as well as the amazing Shanneyganock and Dansability group, who entertained the crowd

well into the afternoon. Since then, the space has seen countless bonfires, hosted our year-end talent show put on by the participants of day camp, and was the venue for Run, Walk, Stroll, and Roll, among other memorable events. Phase 2 continues to provide new opportunities for participants, families, and the community to gather and is one step closer to making St. John's a more inclusive place to live.

Between 2015 and 2021, over \$2 million has been donated and fundraised in support of the development of our park, which includes a \$1 million endowment, and the dream continues to grow. Easter Seals NL will be expanding our park and accessible space even further to phase 3 in the next few years.

This legacy is yours. With your help, generosity, and the continued excitement surrounding the Luxury Cabin Lottery, which sold out in 2021 for the second year in a row, we have created a space that is truly for everyone. A place where children of any ability can engage with friends and family, play safely, and feel like they belong.

Our differences make us who we are

For almost 20 years, Easter Seals NL has been proudly delivering the 'I Can Too' disability awareness program, which teaches the lesson 'we are all different, but very much alike'. Through the program, we have been fortunate to develop relationships with many amazing people, and **Dr. Glenn Barry**, Guidance Services Director at St. Bonaventure's College, is one of them.

In a recent article published in the Newfoundland and Labrador Teachers Association Bulletin, Glenn says the program teaches "young children the nature of various disabilities while educating children that we are all the same in so many ways and yet, just a little different in others." He continues to say that, "Students learn that all

children are more alike than different, in that they all have feelings, want to have friends, and want to have fun. They learn that every individual has strengths and weaknesses, likes and dislikes, which help form their unique personality. Students receive the takeaway message that these special attributes, which all individuals possess, can often be overlooked or masked when a person has a disability."

Glenn continues by stating "the 'I Can Too!' program teaches students that it's okay to be different; differences make us who we are. The program celebrates the uniqueness and developmental diversity of every child while promoting a culture of inclusiveness."

Thank you, Glenn Barry, Karen Doyle, and all of the schools across the province who have welcomed Easter Seals and supported the delivery of our message about disability awareness. We are so grateful to schools, community organizations, and businesses that embrace this program and help us to create positive conversations about disabilities and the importance of acceptance.

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

Supporting growth and opportunity in the community

For several years, the Eastern Edge Gallery has been a committed partner to the Opportunities Fund program, which works to bridge the gap between employees and employers in Newfoundland and Labrador. Located in St. John's, the Gallery is a non-profit business, community space, and an arts centre which includes Artist exhibition areas, studios, and a library. "Running an Artist-run centre is no easy task," explains Philippa Jones, Executive Director at the Gallery. "To manage such a space you need knowledge and competency in all these areas, in addition to a passion for contemporary art and advocating for artists. It takes a special person to be so capable and at the same time to bring warmth and welcome to our community. Ashley has all these qualities and more."

In May 2021, Ashley Hemmings began their journey as an Opportunities Fund participant with Easter Seals and a few months later, gained a long-term position at the Gallery. "As an artist living and working with mental illness, I am incredibly lucky to have been able to receive funding for a job within my field of study, thanks to the Opportunities Fund," says Ashley. "I started working at Eastern Edge as a Gallery Assistant and have since worked my way up to being the Operations Manager."

Since hiring Ashley, the Gallery has seen incredible growth. "Ashley's ability to shoulder the duties of running Eastern Edge, to think independently, take responsibility, and to lead has reduced my stress and is setting Eastern Edge up to grow even more," says Philippa. "It is wonderful to be able to share my knowledge with Ashley, and to have someone





else share in the continued success and stability of our precious arts centre.

"Ashley's contribution to our team is invaluable. Their perspective, education, experience and drive, in addition to their affability, warmth and understanding, have already benefited Eastern Edge hugely. Ashley has secured more funding that has enabled additional arts projects, increased accessibility renovations to our space, and included the hiring of more staff. Ashley is a natural leader, looks out for their colleagues, and helps to maintain a fun, supportive and vibrant work environment."

"As a charity dependent upon funding and fundraising to operate, Eastern Edge Gallery rarely has the resources to employ the number of staff we need to truly flourish," says Philippa. "With regular investment from the Opportunities Fund, we have been able to leverage this support to ask for further funding from our operational funders."

I found my way back to the workplace

In 2013, I found myself in a medical crisis that had kept me from working. Recovery took some time and when I was better, I felt going back into the workforce would be beneficial to both my physical and mental health. I had been looking for employment on my own, but then determined I would need some assistance to make my re-entry into the workforce successful. I reached out to Easter Seals' Opportunities Fund staff and learned that they were able to offer wage subsidies to help people with disabilities to enter the workforce. I hoped that it would be the difference in finding employment in my community.

I approached the Owner of the Marystown Heritage Museum - Furniture store, and he agreed to hire me. I had hoped I would be kept on as this was a new career for me and like everything, there was a chance it wouldn't work out. At the end of the program, opportunity knocked and I was able to secure employment. I am very pleased to say that I am still working for the same business and absolutely loving it.

This opportunity would not have been possible without Easter Seals and the Opportunities Fund program that is designed for people just like me. Health is Wealth; this program gave me back life in many ways. There was a time when I was unsure if I would ever work again. I will be forever grateful to this organization, which took a chance on me, allowing me to develop new skills and put them into action.

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All the places he could go

Have you ever experienced such overwhelming joy that it took your breath away? This is how I felt when I was able to take my (then) 5-year-old son on a hike through the woods for the very first time.

Lyndon lives with moderate spastic quadriplegic cerebral palsy and is nonverbal. I never dreamed a hike with him would ever be possible. That is until last spring when we borrowed a Hippocampe, an all-terrain wheelchair. The moment he sat in this chair I could visualize all the places he could go, places that his regular wheelchair would not get him.

Our loan of the Hippocampe was limited so I made sure to make good use of it while we had it. Lyndon was able to go on family hikes and other outdoor adventures that were once impossible, like exploring the east coast trail. Yes, you read that right! His first hike is one I will never forget.

As we walked along the trail leading to the suspension Bridge in LaManche I could hear his sounds of wonder and excitement. His smile lit up his face. He was having the time of his life. His twin brother who was walking alongside him commented on how happy he was to have Lyndon with us. At one point, I became so overwhelmed that I had to stop and take a moment. I couldn't believe this was happening; it was a dream come true.

Each adventure brought more joy, more happiness, more excitement. The feelings we were experiencing as a family were something I wanted other families to experience as well.





So with the support from my amazing sister, Vickii, we began fundraising for a Hippocampe of our own. Our fundraising efforts took off and Lyndon was gifted a Hippocampe from a local businessman, Mr. Dan Matthews from Volkswagen St. John's. Our plans changed from buying one for Lyndon to buying an additional one to donate.

Since our story went public, I have received several messages from other families who have immediately got on the waitlists to borrow Hippocampes. I've seen their smiles, firsthand, as their dreams have come true.

It's been an amazing journey and I'm so extremely grateful to everyone who played a role in getting these Hippocampes for the disabled community. From the bottom of my heart, thank you. We have so many adventures yet to come!
